WIDER VIEW

For how long will Business Communication stay as a "Lesikar's book course"?

Due to the rapidly flourishing sectors of business and commerce, Business English — in the form of Business Communication — has been a prime aspect of ESP (English for Specific Purpose) programs worldwide. Over the years, Business Communication has naturally established itself as a crucial professional course in our country too.

But quite strangely, as my experience goes, very few teachers try to realize that Business Communication is not merely a bookish subject where showing some power point slides and distributing a handful of photocopied notes serve the purpose. Added to these is the overwhelming dependence of everyone on Raymond Lesikar's text book.

God knows how and why Business Communication in our universities got confined into the circle — more accurately, vicious cycle — of 'Lesikar's book' from where there has been no escape.

Accepting the fact that Lesikar is one of the pioneering figures of communication studies, it is desired that all teachers to rethink for a while: do our undergrad students of Business Communication really need to swallow the expressions, approaches, and styles from Lesikar which are often unnecessarily strenuous, redundantly boring and inconsistently uncreative for them?

I have come across lots of graduates from both public and private universities to whom Business Communication was 'just a dull, worthless subject' where teachers had 'virtually nothing to do outside Lesikar' and ultimately they expected a 'generic grade regardless of their understanding or misunderstanding the subject matters'. 'Lesikar Syndrome' is at its best, no doubt. Shouldn't we be teaching this course in a more innovative and interesting manner putting in Bangladeshi corporate examples and cases so that it becomes meaningful and socio-culturally attractive?

Dealing with 'Lesikar-less' Business Communication in AIUB for quite a long time, we have realized one thing: it is the most relevant course that helps students pass some remarkable, memorable and fruitful moments inside the classrooms.

It makes them smarter than they can ever imagine!

International Mother Language Day celebrated in grandeur

Prof. Fakrul Alam's interactive colloquium on POST COLONIALISM AND GLOBALIZATION

AIUB's Department of English organized an interestingly interactive colloquium titled *Postcolonialism in the Era of Globalization* on 17 March, Tuesday, at the AIUB auditorium. Dr. Fakrul Alam, Professor of English at the University of Dhaka and currently the Advisor of the English Department at the East West University, was the main speaker.

The colloquium, which was attended by faculty members and students of AIUB as well as faculty members of other prominent universities, featured lively discussions on Postcolonialism from ideological and geopolitical perspectives.

After a brief introductory address by Dr. Faheem Hasan Shahed (Head of the English Department), Dr. Charles C Villanueva (Dean of Arts and Social Sciences Faculty) introduced Prof. Fakrul Alam and highlighted his scholastic achievements in the literary field.

He then welcomed all the guests from other universities and wished the colloquium a success.

In his eloquent, scholarly deliberation, Prof. Alam explained why the understanding of postcolonialism is needed to understand the facets of hope and despair in our lives a thereby look into ourselves for reshaping our value systems, and rediscover of the 'selves' we all maintain.

He argued how Postcolonialism is inextricably related with the understanding of colonialism, and how we all need to rejuvenate our thoughts — wiping out the Eurocentric colonial mindset hidden inside us.



Prof. Alam argued with interesting examples how the powerful nations, in the name of globalization, have propagated the 'corporatization of the world' and have led us to believe that emancipation would arrive only through their outlook and framework, instead of ours. And in believing so, we have adopted ourselves in the Postcolonial cosmopolitanism, in the brand name of "globalization" — eventually allowing them to overwhelm us in all sorts of ethical, academic, linguistic, political and otherwise terms. He therefore stressed on the importance of adopting "internationalization".

Prof. Alam's speech was followed by a lively question-answer session—both by the faculty members and students.

Amid loud applause, Dr. Charles thanked Prof. Alam for his wonderful presentation and presented him with AIUB gift-pack and a special Certificate of Appreciation on behalf of the Vice Chancellor. A delightful snacks-&-coffee session followed right after that.
